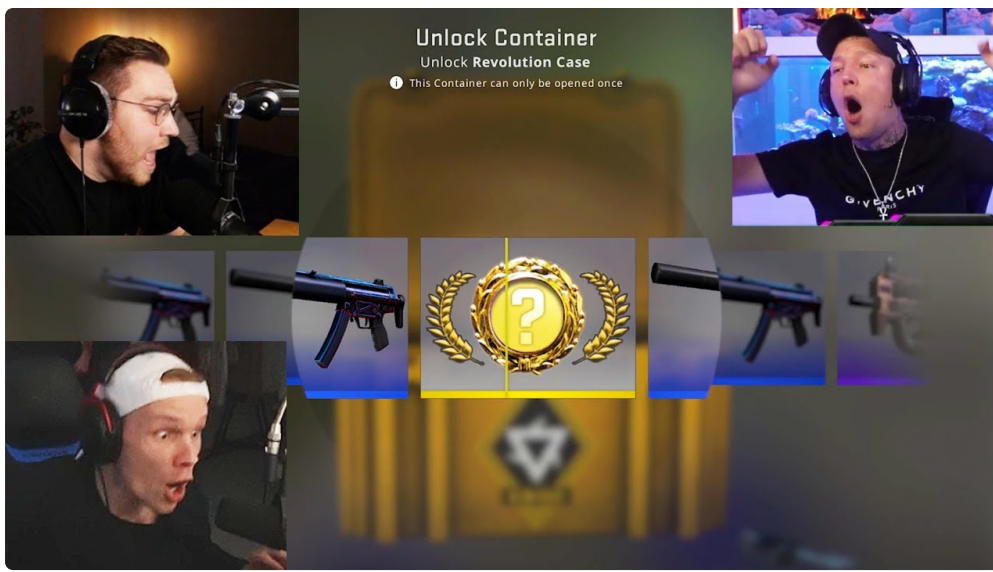
In a standard case battle:

How a Standard Case Battle Works

To provide readers a clearer photo of the gameplay loop, the following breakdown illustrates a normal 1v1 battle setup.



Stage Description Player A Outcome Gamer B Outcome

1. Lobby Creation A gamer chooses a set of cases (e.g., 3x Danger Zone, 2x Prisma) and sets the gamer count (2, 3, or 4 gamers). Produces a 1v1 lobby costing £ 20 total. Signs up with the lobby, matching the £ 20 buy-in.

2. The Drop Phase Cases open sequentially round-by-round. Animations play concurrently for enjoyment.

Round 1: £ 0.50 Round 2: £ 15.00 Round 3: £ 1.20 Round 1: £ 0.40 Round 2: £ 0.80 Round 3: £ 5.00

3. Last Tally The site calculates the overall market price of all products pulled by each participant. Overall Value: **£ 16.70** Total Value: **£ 6.20**

4. Payout The winner is stated, and all items from both swimming pools are moved to the winner's site inventory. **Winner!** Gets products worth £ 22.90 overall. **Loser.** Receives nothing.

Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

Innovation on third-party websites has actually led to a number of variations of the timeless formula. Players are no longer restricted to simple 1v1 matches. Typical variations consist of:

- **Free-For-All (FFA):** Four players enter, however only one walks away with the whole loot pile.

- **Terminal/Sudden Death Battles:** If a tie takes place, a tie-breaker round determines the winner.
