When Facepunch presents new skins to the official Item Store every Thursday, gamers purchase them straight from Steam at a repaired price. When purchased, these items have a one-week trade limitation. After that week expires, players can trade them with pals or offer them on the **Steam Community Market** for Steam Wallet funds.

This creates a vibrant market determined by supply and demand. Rare skins, ceased items, and those preferred by popular content creators can increase in worth.

Key Factors Influencing Skin Prices

- **Supply:** How lots of copies of the skin were bought during its time in the main shop. Low-supply items typically appreciate in worth.
- **Need:** Is the skin visually pleasing? Does it use tactical advantages (like camouflage)?
- **Youtuber/Streamer Hype:** If a popular *Rust* content developer uses a specific skin set, need for those items often rises.
- **Meta Changes:** If a particular weapon or armor piece ends up being greatly favored in the current game meta, skins for that item might see a rise in appeal.
