



A septic system does its job quietly, which is exactly why many homeowners forget about it until something goes wrong. By the time you notice a slow drain, a sour odor near the yard, or soggy ground over the tank or field, the problem is rarely small. What could have been handled with routine pumping or a simple inspection can turn into excavation, emergency service calls, damaged landscaping, and repair bills that sting.
