However, it's important to note these units tend to be less common, and powered by 15A dedicated circuits rather than 20A or higher. Brands like **Zone Air**, **Cooper & Hunter**, and **MrCool** offer models tailored for these applications.

Key Electrical Considerations: No Extension Cords Allowed
