

What carpenter ants are and why they're a problem in Hamilton

Carpenter ants remain some of the most frequent structural pests affecting Hamilton homes and businesses. Unlike ants that simply forage for food, carpenter ants tunnel into wood to create nesting areas, which can lead to serious **structural damage** over time.
