How Galvanized Steel Pipes Age and Drive Replacement Decisions

Galvanized steel pipes, common in homes built before the 1980s, corrode from the inside out. A repair to a single section of galvanized pipe costs \$150–\$400, but if your pipes are more than 50 years old, the surrounding pipe is likely corroded as well. You may fix one leak only to face another in six months. Replacement of galvanized steel with modern material—copper or PEX—costs significantly more upfront, typically \$1,500–\$4,000 depending on your home's layout, but eliminates future failures and gives you 50+ years of reliable service. Replacing copper with new copper or switching to PEX runs \$2,000–\$5,000 or more for a full home repipe.
