- **Trade Holds:** The introduction of a seven-day holding duration for traded items significantly slowed down the speed of skin gambling, as gamers could no longer instantly cycle skins between matches.

- **Cease and Desist Orders:** Valve has routinely sent legal warnings to major gambling operators, forcing numerous prominent sites to close down or pivot their organization designs.

Despite these efforts, the market adapts. Numerous modern platforms have actually moved toward accepting cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) together with or rather of direct skin <https://skinlords.com/> deposits, effectively bypassing Steam's trade restrictions while maintaining a "gamer-centric" branding.
