4. Overalls (Over/Under)

This market concentrates on the total variety of rounds played in a map or the overall variety of maps played in a series.

- **Over/Under Maps:** Betting whether a series will end in 2 maps (Under 2.5) or go to a 3rd map (Over 2.5).
- **Over/Under Rounds:** Predicting whether the map will be a blowout (Under 26.5) or a long, dragged out affair (Over 26.5).

Map-Specific Props

Some platforms enable bettors to wager on:

- Which team will protect the first kill (First Blood).

- Whether the map will enter into Overtime.

Tournament Outrights

This includes wagering on the eventual winner of a significant event, such as a PGL Major or an Intel Extreme Masters (IEM) tournament. While these bets can take days or weeks to deal with, they use considerable odds compared to private match-winners.
