As the table shows, the chances of unboxing a high-tier item are extremely slim. A gamer has approximately a 1-in-400 chance of unboxing a knife or set of gloves (Gold tier).



Additionally, within these tiers, there is an extra layer of randomization known as **Wear Rating (Float Value)** and the possibility of getting a **StatTrak™** version.

- **StatTrak™:** Adds a physical counter to the weapon that tracks eliminates. The chance of receiving a StatTrak™ item is around **10%** of the standard drop rate.
- **Float Values:** Range from Factory New (0.00 - 0.07) to Battle-Scarred (0.45 - 1.00), drastically impacting the weapon's visual appearance and market price.

3. The Economics of the Steam Market

The economy surrounding CS: GO skins is totally player-driven, controlled by supply and need, and assisted in by the Steam Community Market and third-party trading websites.

Because the vast majority of case openings result in low-tier items (Mil-Spec and Restricted skins) that deserve just a few cents, the expected monetary return (EV) of opening a case is mathematically lower than the £ 2.50 expense of the key. In other words: **the house generally wins.**

 - **Rip-offs and Fraud:** Unscrupulous sites might rig chances or make withdrawing won items difficult.

- **Age and Location Restrictions:** Many jurisdictions strictly control or outright restriction virtual gaming websites.
