

Why spiders get into Hamilton homes

Spiders generally do not get into a home randomly; they follow circumstances that help them thrive. Exterior lighting can attract insects, which then attracts spiders. If you have bright white lights near doors or garage entries, consider switching to less attractive bulbs and placing lights farther from direct entry areas when possible. Reducing insect activity around entrances can support improved spider control.

Storing firewood also matters. Firewood piles often harbour insects and provide shelter for spiders. Store firewood away from the house and keep it elevated off the ground if possible. Bringing wood directly beside the foundation can increase the chance that spiders move indoors.

For Hamilton homes near the Niagara Escarpment or close to areas influenced by Lake Ontario, outdoor conditions can stay humid for parts of the year. That makes landscaping and moisture management even more important. Smart outdoor maintenance is a key part of integrated pest management because it helps reduce the conditions that support pests around the home.
