Low-to-Moderate (50/50 chances minus platform rake) **Jackpot/ Pot** Several gamers deposit skins into a communal pool. Each skin contributes to the gamer's "ticket" share. A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the entire pot. High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Simulates the main Valve case openings, often with higher or tailored odds and unique reward swimming pools. High (Typically unfavorable go back to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or cash on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live odds. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate risk)
