4.1. Official Steam Community Market (SCM)

- **Pros:** Direct combination with Steam, secure transactions, immediate shipment to inventory.
- **Cons:** Prices tend to be greater due to Valve's transaction fee (15%).

4.2. Licensed Third-Party Marketplaces

- **Examples:** G2A, Kinguin, CSGOStash (for skins, not secrets), and trusted skin-trading websites such as **Skinbaron** or **Buff.163**.
