Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, resolve the following troubleshooting actions systematically.

1. Verify the Integrity of Game Files

Over time, game files can become damaged due to unexpected system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or malfunctioning storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to inspect and replace missing out on or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and choose **Properties**.
- Navigate to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Await the procedure to surface (Steam will immediately download any corrupted files), then reboot your computer.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

Your graphics card driver is the bridge in between your hardware and CS: GO. Outdated or damaged drivers are a main source of video game instability.

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or visit the official NVIDIA site to download the current Game Ready Driver.
- **AMD Users:** Use the AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to look for updates.
- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes started immediately after a chauffeur upgrade, use a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to totally clean the old driver before installing a steady, older variation.

3. Adjust Launch Options

Particular launch choices can require CS: GO to run in a more stable environment, bypassing intro videos or forcing specific DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, look for **Launch Options**.
- Get in the following advised stable commands (separated by areas):
 - -novid (Skips the introduction video, reducing load-time crashes)
 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU top priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and performance settings to default if the video game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

Permissions issues can often prevent CS: GO from accessing necessary system files or conserving configuration changes.

- Browse to your CS: GO installation folder (generally C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- Find the primary executable file (csgo.exe).
- Right-click the file and choose **Properties**.
- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and examine **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Look For Background Application Interference

Overlay software application and hardware monitoring tools often hook into the DirectX pipeline of video games, which can trigger unexpected crashes. Attempt disabling the following applications while playing:

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party antivirus software application (attempt adding an exclusion for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If fundamental fixes stop working to solve the concern, the issue might lie much deeper within your operating system or hardware setup.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM provides an efficiency increase, CS: GO is infamously delicate to hardware instability.

- If you have used an aggressive overclock, attempt dialing it back to standard factory requirements.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is triggering the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

Often, remaining customized maps, out-of-date workshop items, or heavily modified configuration files trigger persistent conflicts.



- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand navigate to the installation directory site (... steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and erase any staying folders.
- Re-install a fresh copy of the game.

Preventative Maintenance Checklist

To minimize the possibilities of future crashes destroying your video gaming sessions, keep this quick upkeep list in mind:

- **Keep Windows Updated:** Install the current cumulative updates for your os.
- **Monitor Temperatures:** Use keeping track of software application to ensure your CPU and GPU aren't overheating during extended gaming sessions.
- **Clear DirectX Shader Cache:** Periodically clear your GPU's shader cache by means of the NVIDIA/AMD control board to avoid rendering errors.

- **Clean Your PC:** Dust buildup can cause thermal throttling, causing system freezes and crashes. Clean your hardware parts every couple of months.
