- Constitutional patriotism: I pledge to shared policies and rights more than any leader or celebration.

They set the flag on a foundation of concepts like representation, dignity, and due process, rather than on adoration of personalities or totalizing myths. - Practice reciprocity, invite groups to each one other's vacations and memorials, and share the mic.
