

Lindenhurst sits in that part of Suffolk County where the land and water seem to negotiate with each other every day. You feel it in the broad sky, in the salt on the air after a windy afternoon, and in the way the village's streets open toward canals, marinas, and the edge of the Great South Bay. It is a place with enough history to give it texture and enough everyday life to keep it from feeling frozen in time. That balance is what makes Lindenhurst memorable.
