## Armor and Protection

In *Rust*, security is the difference in between brushing off a gunshot and heading back to the beach. Armor worths on the wiki are computed based upon **rust skins** physical defense, projectile security, and radiation resistance.

### Typical Armor Sets

- **Burlap/ Leather Set:** Early video game protection; simple to craft, offers very little defense against guns, however decent versus cold and wildlife.
- **Road Sign/ Wolf Headdress Set:** Mid-game meta. Balances movement speed with dependable bullet defense.
- **Metal Facemask/ Metal Chest Plate:** The gold requirement for late-game PvP. Combined with a hoodie and pants, this package offers optimal defense versus raids and strolling squads.

## Raiding Tools and Explosives

If constructing a fortress is half the battle, taking apart somebody else's is the other half. The Rust Items Wiki provides accurate explosive calculations, helping raiding parties determine how numerous resources they require to breach a base's honeycomb walls.

- **Satchel Charges:** Unreliable, volatile, however inexpensive for mid-game raids.
- **Timed Explosive Charge (C4):** The timeless, trusted base-destroyer. Deals huge localized damage.
- **Explosive 5.56 Rifle Ammo:** Fired from a silenced rifle, this method is quieter and allows for exact splash damage on doors and walls.
- **Rocket Launcher:** Uses Rocket, High Velocity Rocket, or Incendiary Rocket ammunition for devastating splash damage.
