Common Window Issues and How to Address Them

1. Drafty Windows

A drafty window is a clear sign that the seal has actually failed or the weatherstripping has used down.

2. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If moisture appears *in between* the panes of a double-hung window, the insulating gas seal has actually failed.

- **The Fix:** Unfortunately, defogging kits are usually short-term fixes. The most irreversible option is to change the insulated glass unit (IGU) or the entire window sash.

3. Stuck or Hard-to-Open Windows

Paint accumulation, deformed wood, or a filthy track can trigger a window to jam.



- **The Fix:** Clean out debris from the tracks using a vacuum and a stiff brush. For wooden windows supported paint, run an utility knife carefully along the paint joint. Lube moving tracks with a silicone-based spray (avoid sticky lubes like WD-40, which draw in dirt).

Common Door Issues and How to Address Them

Doors swing, slide, and slam numerous times a week. Consequently, their hardware takes a tremendous whipping.

1. Squeaky or Stiff Hinges

A squeaking hinge is frustrating, however a stiff hinge locations unneeded tension on the door frame and screws.

- **The Fix:** Remove the hinge pin, clean it tidy with a rag, and use a few drops of light-weight machine oil or white lithium grease before reinserting the pin.

2. Doors That Stick or Won't Latch

If a door rubs against the frame or refuses to click into the strike plate, the house may have settled, or the hinge screws have actually loosened.

- **The Fix:** Start by tightening the screws on the leading hinge. If the door still rubs, you might require to eliminate a thin layer of wood utilizing a hand aircraft or sander along the binding edge. If the lock misses the strike plate, moving the strike plate slightly up or down generally fixes the problem.

3. Damaged Thresholds

The threshold (the sill at the bottom of an outside door) takes heavy foot traffic and continuous moisture exposure, causing rot or denting.

- **The Fix:** Aluminum limits can often be adjusted via built-in screws that raise or lower the platform. Wood limits suffering from rot must be entirely changed to avoid water from permeating into the subfloor.

4. **Procedure and Cut:** Measure the leading and sides of the door frame. Cut the new weatherstripping material to length utilizing utility shears or a hacksaw (if handling metal-backed strips).
5. **Install:** Press the brand-new weatherstripping strongly into the kerf groove, or peel the adhesive liner and stick it securely against the stop molding. Close the door to guarantee a snug, even seal without making the door challenging to latch.

4. How typically should I perform maintenance on my windows and doors?

Property owners should perform an extensive inspection of all windows and doors a minimum of twice a year-- typically in the spring and fall. Check for smooth operation, oil moving parts, clear out weep holes in sliding windows, and inspect exterior caulking.
