Popular Strategies Used on Crash Sites

- **The Low-Multiplier Auto-Cashout:** Players set an automated cashout at an extremely low multiplier, such as 1.01 x to 1.10 x. While this yields frequent, small wins, a single 1.00 x crash can erase lots of incremental success.
- **The Martingale System:** A classic progressive betting technique where a player doubles their bet after every loss, attempting to recover all previous losses plus an earnings when they finally win. This requires a huge bankroll and typically hits table or site limitations throughout a losing streak.
- **The Anti-Martingale (Paroli) System:** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, attempting to take advantage of winning streaks while lessening damage during cold runs.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for extended streaks of low crashes (e.g., numerous rounds under 1.50 x) and wagering high on a perceived "high multiplier" coming soon. (Note: This succumbs to the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent occasion).
