Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Minor acnes, small scratches, or small paint breaking, typically just noticeable upon close examination.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most typical condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and noteworthy paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Incredibly used, greatly faded, and sometimes dramatically modified appearance. Some collectors particularly look for extreme BS floats for a "blackimov" impact.

Beyond standard wear, some skins also include a **StatTrak™** technology module, which tracks the variety of eliminates a gamer gets with that specific weapon, adding a radiant orange digital counter to the body of the weapon.



The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic products in lots of other modern computer game, CS2 skins have real-world financial value because they are completely tradeable and marketable.
