

Commack sits in that part of Suffolk County that people often know before they can quite describe it. It is not a resort town, not a dense downtown, and not the kind of place that announces itself with a skyline or a postcard view. Instead, it has the steadiness of a long-settled Long Island community that grew around roads, mills, farms, and later the spread of suburbia.
