Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Significant wear, heavy scratches, and notable paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Incredibly used, heavily faded, and in some cases drastically altered appearance. Some collectors particularly look for extreme BS floats for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond basic wear, some skins likewise include a **StatTrak**™ innovation module, which tracks the variety of eliminates a gamer gets with that particular weapon, adding a radiant orange digital counter to the body of the weapon.
