5. **Stickers and Souvenirs:** Tournament mementos and weapons decorated with unusual, discontinued sticker labels (like Katowice 2014 holo stickers) can multiply a skin's baseline value exponentially.

The Holy Grails: Most Legendary Rare CS: GO Skins

1. AWP|Dragon Lore (Souvenir)

2. StatTrak™ M4A4|Groan (Factory New)

The Howl is unique because it is the just "Contraband" quality item in the video game. Soon after its release in 2014, Valve found that the art work was plagiarized. Valve right away got rid of the case, changed the art work, and updated the existing M4 Howls to "Contraband" status, halting any brand-new drops permanently.

- **Approximated Value:** £ 30,000 to £ 100,000+ (depending upon stickers and wear)

3. AK-47|Case Hardened (Pattern 661 - "The Blue Gem")

While the Case Hardened surface prevails, certain pattern design templates include almost 100% strong blue on the top magazine and receiver. Pattern index 661 in Factory New condition is widely thought about the supreme AK-47 skin.



- **Approximated Value:** Estimated to be worth upwards of £ 400,000 to £ 500,000 based upon recent personal collector deals.

4. Karambit|Case Hardened (Blue Gem - Pattern 387)

Similar to the AK-47, the Karambit Case Hardened with pattern index 387 features a completely blue playside. A pristine Factory New variation of this knife is held by a single collector who famously declined a EUR1.2 million offer.

- **Estimated Value:** Priceless/ Over £ 1,000,000
