## The "Right to Choose" Pathway in England

- **Lisdexamfetamine Alternatives:** Sometimes Bupropion or Clonidine are used off-label.

Titration requires persistence, self-awareness, and organization. Patients can make the process smoother by embracing a number of practical techniques:

- **Keep a Daily Journal:** Track your mood, performance, sleep patterns, food intake, and any adverse effects. Memory can be undependable, and concrete notes assist clinicians make much better decisions.
- **Display Vitals:** Invest in a home blood pressure and heart rate display. Most clinicians will require these measurements routinely throughout stimulant titration.
- **Maintain Routines:** Try to take your medication at the very same time every day (typically mornings, to avoid sleeping disorders) and keep consistent consuming and sleeping routines.
