Note: Exact chances can vary from case to case; some more recent cases change likelihoods a little to reflect market need.

* ROI (Return on Investment) is calculated as the average resale value of the rarest skin divided by the overall cost of the case plus secret, expressed as a percentage.

Note: Market rates fluctuate [cs2 case opening](#) extremely based on supply, need, and neighborhood belief. Gamers must deal with case opening as home entertainment rather than a dependable source of earnings.

Elements Influencing Case Value

- **Rarity of the included skins:** Cases that feature recently introduced "Covert" or "Rare" skins frequently see a spike in need.
- **Supply dynamics:** Limited-time cases (e.g., operation cases) become scarce after the operation ends, increasing costs.
- **Neighborhood trends:** Viral videos or expert gamers showcasing a rare pull can cause a short-term surge in interest.
- **Key pricing:** Valve adjusts the cost of secrets periodically, straight affecting the cost of opening a case.

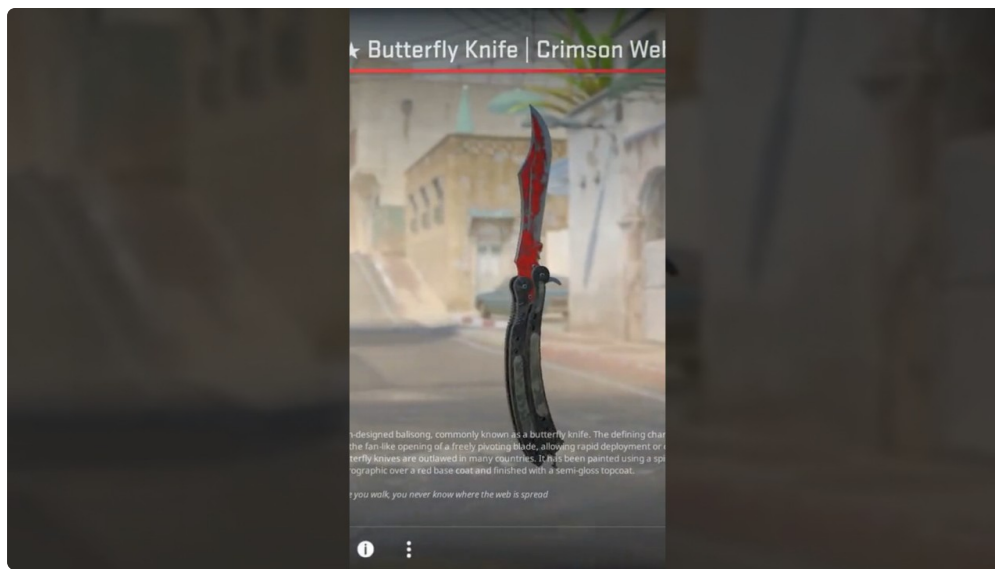
5. Can I trade cases for other products?
