3. Stuck or Hard-to-Open Sashes

Paint accumulation, warping due to humidity, or dirt in the tracks can trigger a window to withstand motion.



4. Broken Glass

Mishaps happen, and a cracked or shattered pane needs immediate attention to keep home security and climate control.

How to Fix a Drafty Window

Drafts are the main perpetrator behind high energy costs. Fixing them is typically simple and low-cost.

Step-by-Step Draft Mitigation:

1. **Locate the Leak:** On a windy day, gradually move a lit incense stick the window frame. Where the smoke flickers or blows sideways, there is a leak.
2. **Use Weatherstripping:** For movable sashes, applying V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the jambs seals the spaces when the window is closed.
3. **Caulk the Frame:** For spaces between the fixed window frame and the exterior or interior wall, use a bead of exterior-grade silicone or paintable latex caulk.
4. **Change Glazing Putty:** On older wooden windows, the putty holding the glass in place may have broken and fallen out. Scrape away the old putty and apply a fresh layer of window glazier's putty.

How to Fix a Stuck or Jammed Window

A stuck window can be a significant safety danger in case of a fire. Depending on the window material (wood, vinyl, or aluminum), the fix varies.

For Wooden Windows:

- **The Culprit:** Usually layers of old paint acting like glue.
- **The Fix:** Run an utility knife thoroughly along the seam where the sash meets the frame to break the paint bond. If the wood has swollen due to humidity, await drier weather condition, then gently tap a wood block against the sash with a hammer to loosen it. Sand down any high spots and apply paste wax to the tracks.

For Sliding and Vinyl Windows:

- **The Culprit:** Dirt, grit, or a misaligned track.
- **The Fix:** Vacuum the tracks thoroughly. Scrub away stubborn grime using a toothbrush dipped in a mix of warm water and moderate meal soap. Once dry, spray the tracks with a silicone-based lubricant. Avoid utilizing petroleum-based lubricants (like WD-40) on vinyl, as they can degrade the material and attract more dirt.

How to Replace a Broken Single-Pane Glass Window

Changing a single pane of glass is a classic DIY task that needs persistence and safety equipment.

Products Needed:

- Heavy-duty work gloves and shatterproof glass
- Glass cutter and straightedge
- Putty knife
- Glazier's points
- Window putty (glazing substance)
- Primer and paint

The Process:

1. **Safety First:** Put on gloves and shatterproof glass. Tape an "X" throughout the broken pane with duct tape to hold fragments together.
2. **Get Rid Of Broken Glass:** Carefully take out the staying glass shards from the frame. Usage pliers for stubborn pieces.
3. **Clear Old Putty and Points:** Scrape away the old, solidified putty and remove the small metal glazier's points using a chisel or pliers. Wire-brush the rabbet (the recessed location holding the glass) up until clean, then apply a coat of linseed oil or guide to prevent the wood from drawing moisture out of the brand-new putty.
4. **Bed the Glass:** Roll a thin rope of window putty and press it into the rabbet. Press the brand-new, custom-cut glass pane firmly into the putty bed.
5. **Secure and Seal:** Press glazier's points into the wood frame every 6 to 8 inches to hold the glass in place. Apply a triangular bead of putty around the outside border of the glass, smoothing it at an angle with a putty knife. Enable it to treat before painting.

Preventive Maintenance Tips

Repairing a window is great, however preventing future issues is even better. Implementing a semi-annual maintenance routine can extend the life of windows considerably.

- **Clean Tracks Regularly:** Keep dust, leaves, and dead pests out of window tracks every spring and fall.
- **Examine Seals and Caulking:** Check exterior caulking every year. Reapply caulk before winter sets in to prevent water infiltration and freezing damage.
- **Lubricate Moving Parts:** Apply a light silicone spray to hinges, locks, and tracks when a year to ensure smooth operation.
- **Wash Glass and Frames:** Dirt buildup can degrade window finishes and seals in time. A simple wash with soapy water keeps them looking and working well.

Can I fix a foggy double-pane window myself?

While defogging kits are offered online, they are typically a short-lived cosmetic fix. They include drilling tiny holes to dry out the interior and applying an unique vent, but they do not restore the lost thermal insulation. Should I repair or change my windows?

A dry silicone spray or a Teflon-based lubricant is best. Avoid heavy greases or basic WD-40, as they leave a sticky residue that attracts dust, eventually making the window stickier than in the past.

How do I know if my window is energy efficient?

Look for drafts, condensation between panes, and high energy bills. Additionally, try to find the Energy Star label on newer windows or inspect if the glass is double- or triple-paned with a Low-E (low-emissivity) covering.
