This cryptographic technology permits gamers to separately validate that the outcome of every video game is truly random and has actually not been manipulated by the home.

- **How it works:** Before a round starts, the server creates a secret "server seed" and hashes it, revealing the hash to the player. The player's internet browser generates a "client seed." When integrated with a nonce (a counter), these 3 components figure out the game outcome.
- **Verification:** After the round concludes, the unhashed server seed is revealed. Gamers can plug these variables into a verification tool to show your house didn't change the result midway through.
