What on-site locksmith help really changes

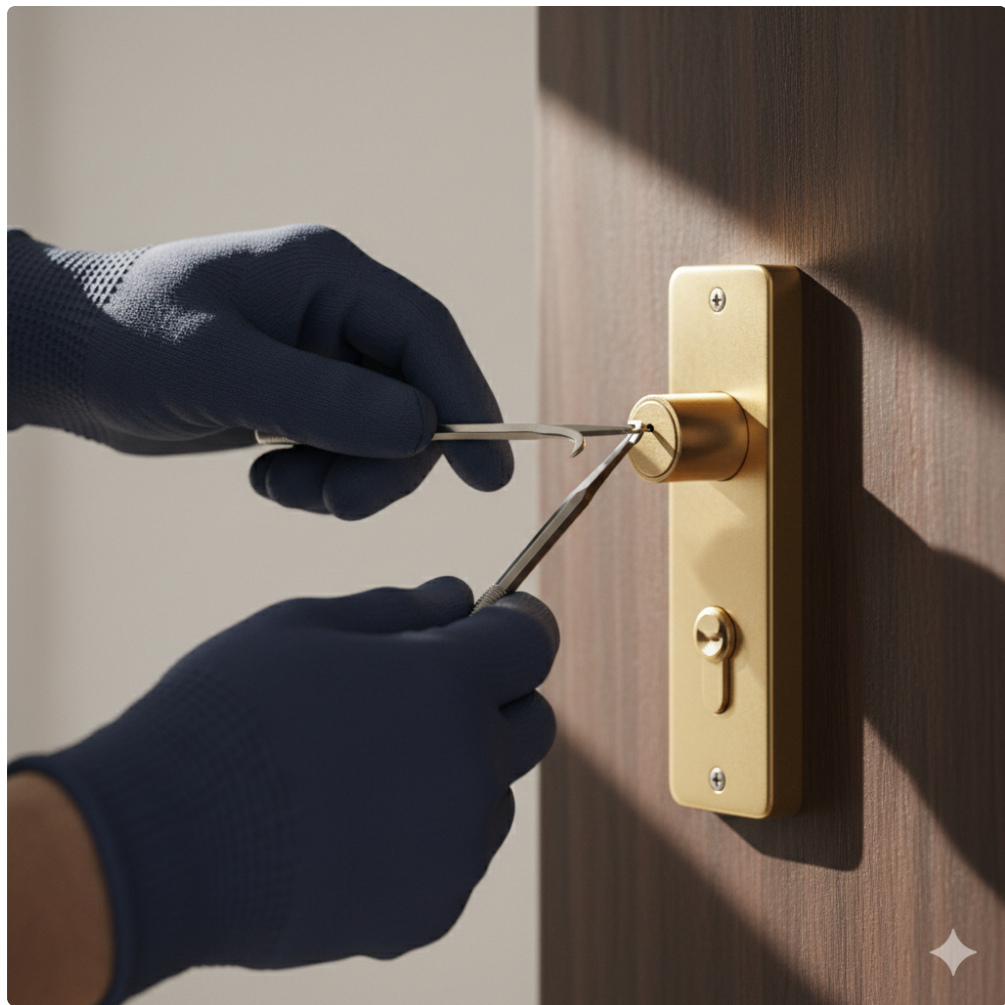
