Use Condition Float Value Range Visual Description **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Beautiful condition with little to no scratches or fading. Typically the most expensive. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Really light wear, typically only noticeable upon close inspection. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Visible scratches and use on popular edges, however the artwork stays largely undamaged. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Substantial wear,

heavy scratching, and visible fading of colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Incredibly used, rusted, or heavily faded. Often demanded for unique "black-grind" results.

The Economy: Cases, Markets, and Trading

The CS: GO skin economy operates much like a real-world stock market. Costs vary based on supply and demand, esports occasions, game updates, and neighborhood belief.

How Players Acquire Skins

- **Random Drops:** Players receive random weapon drops or cases just by playing on authorities or community servers.

- **The Asimov Series:** Instantly recognizable by its futuristic, sci-fi orange-and-white aesthetic, spanning the AWP, M4A4, and P250.
