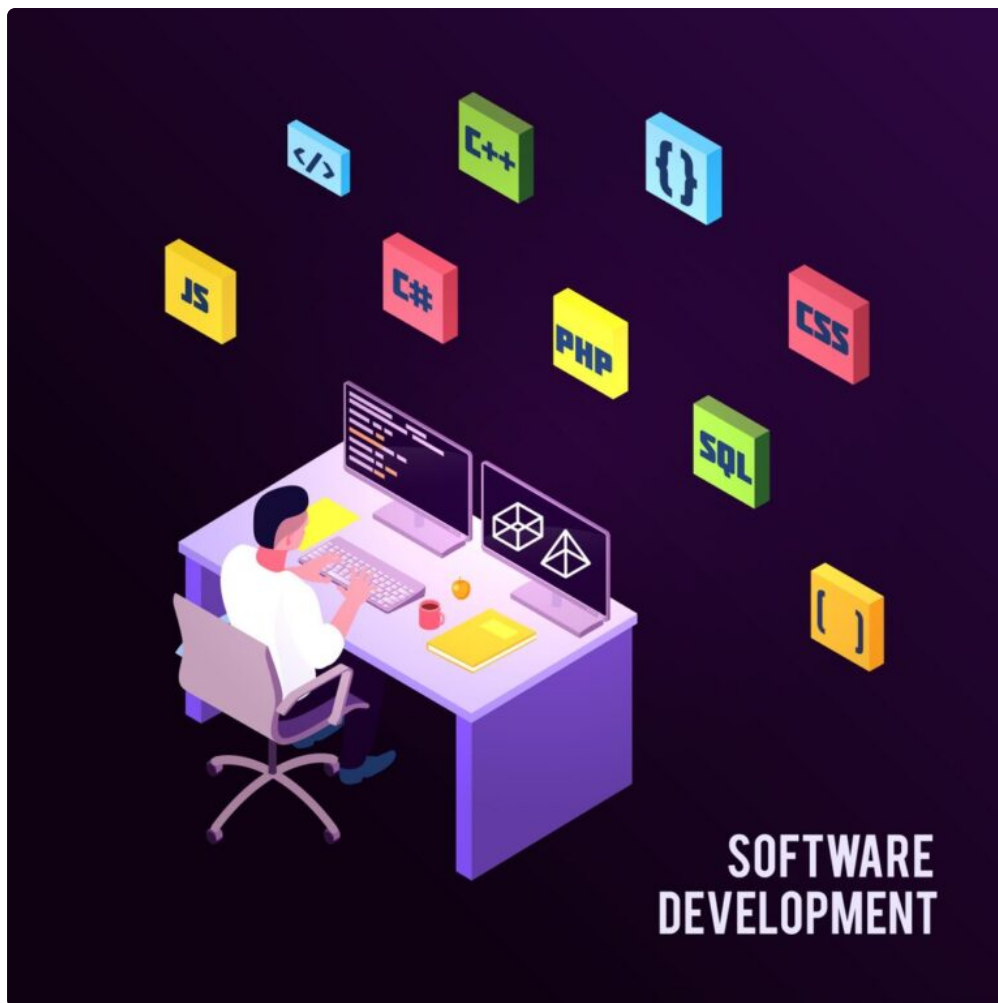




What Makes Lake Ontario a Great Day-Trip Destination from Syracuse
