- **Disable Fullscreen Optimizations:** Prevent Windows from disrupting the game's display mode.

1. Validating Integrity of Game Files

Corrupted installation files are the leading cause of random crashes mid-match.

1. Open the Steam Library.
2. Right-click on **Counter-Strike: Global Offensive** and choose **Properties**.
3. Browse to the **Installed Files** tab.
4. Click **Verify stability of game files**.
5. Wait on Steam to scan and change any damaged files.

2. Changing Launch Options

- Right-click CS: GO in Steam -> > **Properties** -> > **General** -> > **Launch Options**.
- Clear out old commands and try getting in safe mode: -safe

3. Disabling Fullscreen Optimizations

Windows' built-in optimization features can periodically cause stuttering and sudden crashes in DirectX-heavy video games.

1. Navigate to the CS: GO installation folder (normally C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
2. Find the main executable file (csgo.exe).
3. Right-click the file and select **Properties**.
4. Go to the **Compatibility** tab.
5. Check the box for **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.
6. Click **Apply** and after that **OK**.

4. Solving Third-Party Software Conflicts

Particular background applications regularly disrupt Valve's Anti-Cheat (VAC) and the video game customer itself. Understood culprits include:



- Overlays (Discord, GeForce Experience, RivaTuner, MSI Afterburner)
- Custom antivirus software (whitelisting the video game folder frequently solves this)
- Outdated peripheral software (Logitech G Hub, Razer Synapse)

Understanding Common Error Codes

When CS: GO crashes, it typically offers an error message or code. The table listed below outlines what these errors mean and how to repair them.

Mistake Message/ Symptom Probable Cause Recommended Fix **"Engine Error: Out of Memory"** System RAM or VRAM is exhausted. Lower in-game texture settings, close background web browser tabs, and increase the Windows pagefile size. **"VAC Was Unable to Verify the Game Session"** Corrupted security files or interference from background software application. Confirm game files via Steam, reboot the Steam customer, and ensure no unapproved memory editors are running. **Instantaneous Desktop Crash on Startup** Out-of-date graphics drivers or corrupted setup files. Update GPU motorists, delete the cfg folder to reset settings, or re-install DirectX runtimes. **Game Freezes, Sound Loops, then Crashes** GPU driver crash or unstable hardware overclock. Go back any factory or user overclocks on the GPU/CPU and carry out a tidy setup of graphics motorists using DDU

(Display Driver Uninstaller). **DirectX Error/ "Device Hung"** GPU instability, overheating, or driver timeout. Lower graphics settings, cap the framerate (fps_max 300), and inspect GPU cooling.

Advanced Troubleshooting: System-Level Fixes

If basic and intermediate actions stop working, the issue might lie within the OS or hardware configuration.

- **Carry Out a Clean Boot:** Temporarily disable all non-Microsoft services through msconfig to separate third-party software application disputes.
- **Run SFC and DISM Scans:** Corrupted Windows system files can cause unpredictable application crashes. Open Command Prompt as Administrator and run sfc/ scanow, followed by DISM/ Online/ Cleanup-Image/ RestoreHealth.
- **Test Hardware Stability:** Use software application like Prime95 for CPU stability or FurMark for GPU stress testing to make sure hardware isn't stopping working under load.

Q: What should I do if none of these repairs work?

A: If all else stops working, a complete clean reinstall of CS: GO is advised. Uninstall the video game through Steam, by hand erase any staying folders in the Steam directory, and carry out a fresh download.
