

There is a certain kind of Saturday that separates casual yard work from real property maintenance. The grass is heavy from a week of rain. The ditch line has gone wild. The gravel drive has ruts deep enough to catch a boot heel. Somewhere behind the shed, last season's leaves are packed into a damp mat that refuses to surrender.
