5. **Key Gets Stuck:** Once the car is turned off, the key can not be eliminated from the ignition cylinder.
6. **Hot Key or Cylinder:** The metal key or the ignition location feels unusually hot to the touch after driving, showing an electrical short.

What You *Should* Do:

1. **Put the automobile in Park (or Neutral for manuals)** and engage the emergency brake.
2. **Call a mobile automotive locksmith** immediately.
3. **Keep the broken pieces** of the key. The locksmith can use these fragments to cut a new key on the spot utilizing specialized machinery.
