

Dix Hills sits in that part of Long Island that people often drive through without fully noticing, which is part of its charm. It is residential, wooded in places, and quietly self-assured. There is no hard sell here, no boardwalk spectacle, no downtown that tries too hard to announce itself. Instead, Dix Hills rewards people who pay attention.
