Beyond Theater Style

The classic theater configuration—rows of chairs directed at a single dais—is not the only option. Depending on the size of the audience and the character of the function, different configurations could deliver enhanced viewing. A jutting dais, which extends into the gathering, allows people to sit on three sides, boosting the number of quality viewing angles. A circular arrangement, where the stage is in the center, provides complete surrounding visibility but necessitates careful oversight of ingress, egress, and background elements. A U-shape or horseshoe layout can work well for panel conversations and displays where the crowd is more modest.

When You Cannot Be There
