Age Restrictions

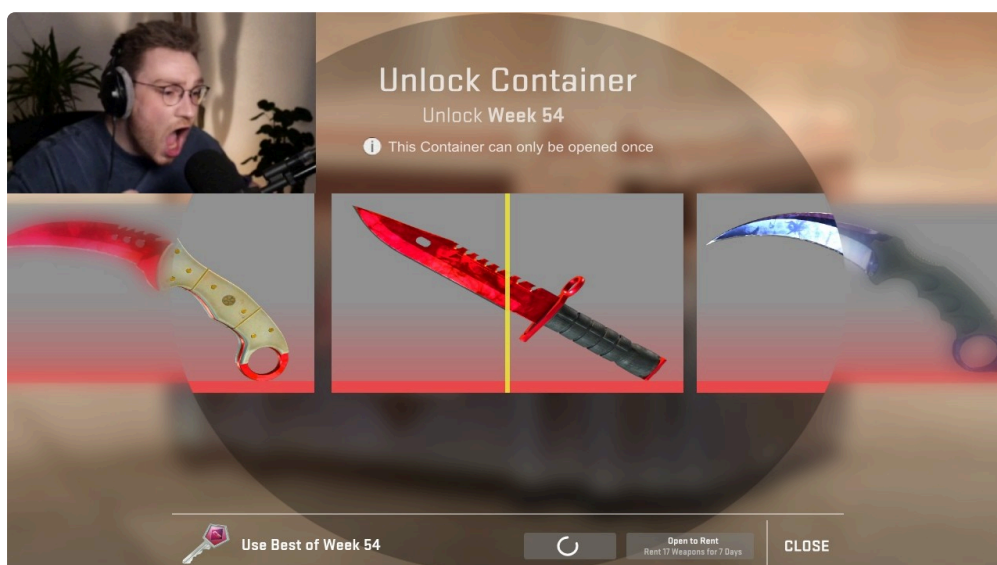
