Rarity in *Counter-Strike* is classified by tiers, color-coded from common to remarkably rare.

As the table demonstrates, the odds of unboxing a high-tier item are incredibly slim. A gamer has approximately a 1-in-400 opportunity of unpacking a knife or set of gloves (Gold tier).

In addition, within these tiers, there is an extra layer of randomization understood as **Wear Rating (Float Value)** and the chance of getting a **StatTrak™** variation.

- **StatTrak™:** Adds a physical counter to the weapon that tracks kills. The chance of receiving a StatTrak™ item is roughly **10%** of the basic drop rate.

- **Float Values:** Range from Factory New (0.00 - 0.07) to Battle-Scarred (0.45 - 1.00), significantly impacting the weapon's visual look and market value.

3. The Economics of the Steam Market

The economy surrounding CS: GO skins is completely player-driven, managed by supply and demand, and assisted in by the Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites.

Since the huge majority of case openings result in low-tier products (Mil-Spec and Restricted **Case Opening** skins) that are worth only a few cents, the anticipated monetary return (EV) of opening a case is mathematically lower than the £ 2.50 expense of the secret.  - **Rip-offs and Fraud:** Unscrupulous websites may rig chances or make withdrawing won products difficult.
 - **Age and Location Restrictions:** Many jurisdictions strictly manage or straight-out restriction virtual betting websites.
