Wear Condition	Drift Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful condition with little to no scratches or fading. Normally the most expensive.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Really light wear, frequently just visible upon close assessment.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious scratches and endure prominent edges, however the artwork stays mainly undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, heavy scratching, and obvious fading of colors.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Exceptionally used, rusted, or greatly faded. Often searched for for special "black-grind" impacts.
