

What counts as a pest emergency?

A **pest emergency** is any situation where pests present an direct health or property threat and you need **urgent pest removal** rather than routine prevention. In Scarborough, that can mean a **rodent infestation** in a kitchen or basement, a **wasp nest** near a doorway or balcony, or **bed bugs** in a bedroom where people may already be waking up with bites. It can also include active **cockroaches** in food-prep areas, or a swarm of **ants** entering through **entry points** around windows, utility lines, or shared walls.

The key question is not just whether pests are present, but whether they are causing immediate harm. Next, **protect children and pets** by moving food, toys, water bowls, and bedding away from the affected room. The safety of children and pets should come before cleanup or pest control attempts. It is equally important to **avoid direct contact**. Do not touch nests, dead pests, droppings, or unknown residues with bare hands. Cockroaches are urgent because they expand rapidly, are hard to find, and can make allergies worse. They often show up in kitchens, laundry rooms, and apartment buildings where moisture and food access are easy to find. A few sightings can mean deeper infestation control is needed.

Carpenter ants are particularly important in spring and summer. They do not eat wood, but they can tunnel through damp or damaged framing, especially around windows, roofs, and basements. In Scarborough's mix of older homes and multifamily buildings, moisture-prone areas can make carpenter ants a repeat issue if not addressed quickly.
