The Regulatory and Legal Landscape

The intersection of computer game, minor gambling, and unregulated monetary markets has drawn significant attention from federal governments, regulative bodies, and Valve itself.

Valve's Crackdown

In 2016, Valve provided formal cease-and-desist letters to lots of significant skin gambling sites, specifying that these platforms were violating the Steam Subscriber Agreement by using OpenID and commercial APIs for commercial gambling purposes. Given that then, the community has existed in a perpetual cat-and-mouse video game: sites often alter their domain names, embrace cryptocurrency alternatives, and change their integration techniques to remain functional.
