The [Skin Lords](#) skin economy exploded after Valve presented the "Arms Deal" update in August 2013, which allowed gamers to trade weapons skins on the Steam Community Market. Due to the fact that these skins had real-world financial value, business owners rapidly recognized they could be utilized as an uncontrolled digital currency.

By 2015 and 2016, CS: GO gambling reached a fever pitch. Uncontrolled sites turned up over night, greatly promoted by popular YouTubers and Twitch streamers-- typically without revealing monetary ties to the platforms. This absence of oversight caused major controversies, consisting of accusations of rigged odds and underage gambling.

Valve's Crackdown

In July 2016, Valve provided a huge cease-and-desist wave targeting over 20 major gambling sites, mentioning that these operations breached the Steam Subscriber Agreement. While this temporarily stunted the market, the environment rapidly adapted by introducing peer-to-peer (P2P) trading systems and cryptocurrency combination to bypass direct Steam API restrictions.
