- **Never share your OTP or verification code with anyone, even if they claim to be from BingoPlus support.**
- **A genuine support agent will never ask you for your password, PIN, or verification codes.**
- **Do not share OTPs in screenshots, chats, or emails.**

Remember, OTPs allow immediate access to your account. When a recovery helper asks you for this, it's a *payment request red flag* indicating a scam.

Recognizing Payment Request Red Flags in Account Recovery

Proper customer support is only reachable through official BingoPlus platforms. Here's how to get legitimate help:

- **Authorized support pages:** Emails or links from official dpwishes.in domain (verify carefully!)
- **In-app support options:** Use the help or contact feature built into the official BingoPlus mobile app

Ignore unsolicited contacts from unknown third parties claiming to help recover your BingoPlus account. Also, never download or run remote access software offered by these "helpers."

How to Report Suspicious Recovery Helpers

If you encounter anyone requesting payment or suspicious details for account recovery:

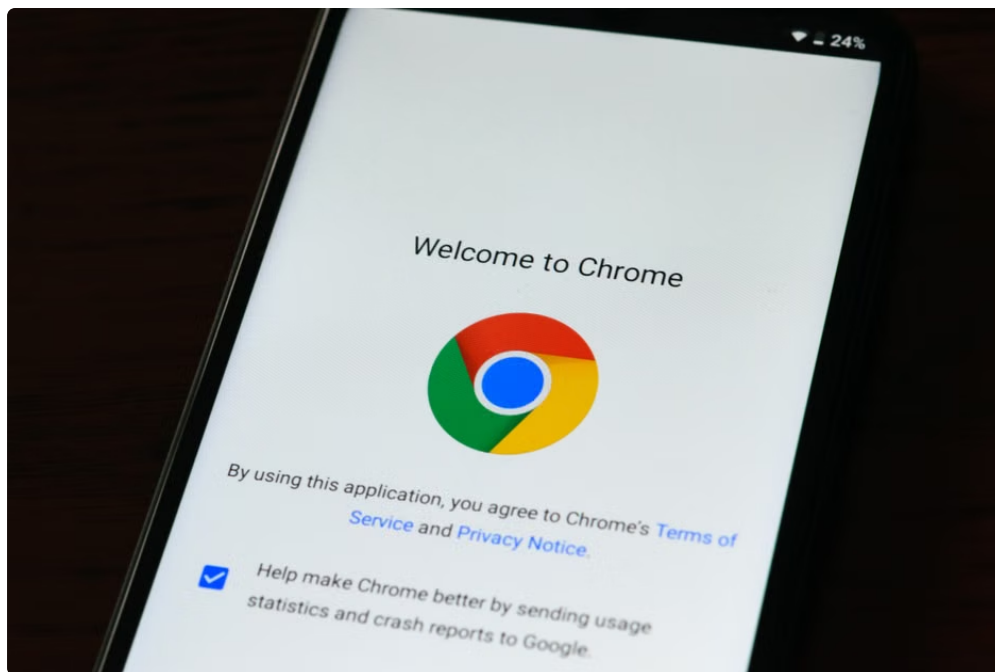
1. Take screenshots (without revealing OTPs or passwords).
