

What Are Pantry Pests and How Do They Get Into Homes?

Pantry pests are pests that infest stored food products in kitchens, cupboards, and storage rooms. They are often called *stored product pests* because they feed on items like flour, cereal, rice, pasta, spices, nuts, and pet food. In many Canadian homes, the problem starts quietly: a few **Eggs** or **Larvae** are already inside a package when it comes home, then the pest develops through its *life cycle* and travels through the pantry.
