3. **Selection:** Facepunch curates a weekly batch of accepted skins.
4. **The Item Store:** Every Thursday, a brand-new batch of skins is launched on the official Rust Item Store for a fixed, low price (usually varying from £ 0.99 to £ 3.00).

Once bought from the main shop, these items have a one-week trade and market restriction. After that week, they go into the Steam Community Market, where supply and need determine their real value.
