

A truly clean space feels different the moment you walk in. The air seems lighter. Hard floors look brighter without that sticky haze that builds up slowly over time. Deep cleaning before maintenance saves time and money

1. Pick up personal clutter from floors, counters, and bathroom surfaces.
2. Secure pets or set a clear plan for them during the visit.
3. Point out priority areas, especially problem bathrooms, kitchens, or odor concerns.
4. Mention delicate surfaces, recent repairs, or anything that should not be moved.
5. Be realistic about the condition of the space and the time booked.
