



Most drain problems do not begin with a dramatic backup. They start quietly, with a sink that empties a little slower than it did last month, a shower that leaves a shallow puddle around your feet, or a kitchen drain that burps after the dishwasher runs. In a busy household, those signals are easy to ignore. School drop-offs, work calls, errands, sports practices, dinner, laundry, and the general churn of family life tend to crowd out small maintenance concerns until they are no longer small.
