Valve's Stance and Crackdowns

- **Verify Platform Legitimacy:** Research community evaluations and independent forums before relying on any third-party platform.

- **Set Strict Financial Limits:** Treat gambling simply as a type of home entertainment with an established budget-- never as a dependable source of income.
