- **StatTrak™:** Items with this technology feature an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of verified eliminates made with that specific weapon.
- **Souvenir Packages:** These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and feature gold stickers representing the groups and MVP of the round.
