AFUE (Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency) is the percentage of fuel a furnace converts into usable heat, with many older standard-efficiency units rated around 80% and modern high-efficiency models commonly reaching 95% or higher. When a homeowner says, "The furnace is running, but the house still feels cold," the issue may not be the thermostat setting at all. It may be reduced AFUE from dirty burners, compromised airflow, a weak blower motor, poor duct design, or improper combustion.

Combustion analysis is a professional diagnostic process that measures how safely and efficiently a gas or oil heating system burns fuel. It is not optional guesswork. The International Fuel Gas Code, National Fuel Gas Code NFPA 54, and Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code all reinforce the importance of safe fuel-burning appliance installation, venting, and operation. In practical terms, that means a heating contractor must look beyond the symptom and verify safety.

A third myth is that short cycling is “just the heater catching up.” Short cycling means the furnace or heat pump starts and stops too frequently, often because of overheating, restricted airflow, improper sizing, faulty limit switches, dirty filters, or thermostat placement issues. Left alone, short cycling can damage blower motors, igniters, control boards, and compressors in heat pump systems.

CFM (cubic feet per minute) is the measurement of airflow moving through a heating or cooling system. Too little CFM across a furnace can cause overheating and limit-switch shutdowns; too much or poorly balanced airflow can create comfort complaints and noise. MERV rating is the scale used to describe an air filter's ability to capture particles, but higher is not always better if the system cannot handle the airflow restriction. A common rule of thumb in the trade is that a minor repair on a newer furnace is usually sensible, while a major repair on a 17- to 22-year-old unit requires deeper evaluation. But rules of thumb should never replace diagnosis. A ten-year-old furnace with a failed blower capacitor is a repair candidate. A 21-year-old furnace with a compromised heat exchanger, recurring ignition failure, and poor combustion readings is a different matter.

BTU (British Thermal Unit) is the standard measurement of heating capacity, and proper BTU sizing matters more than many homeowners realize. Oversized furnaces can short cycle, create uneven temperatures, and wear out prematurely. Undersized systems may run continuously during cold weather and still fail to satisfy the thermostat. In renovated Spring House homes, the original furnace may no longer match the building envelope after additions, insulation upgrades, finished basements, or room conversions.

For boilers, repair-versus-replacement decisions often involve circulator pumps, expansion tanks, pressure relief valves, zone controls, heat exchangers, and venting.
