

Hollywood, Florida has a habit of surprising people. On paper, it can look like a sun-and-sand stop between Fort Lauderdale and Miami, a place to book a beach hotel, eat seafood, and move on. Spend a little time here, though, and the city starts to show a more layered personality.
