3. Analyze Case Cost vs. Return Potential

- Search for neighborhood evaluations, trusted withdrawal speeds, and responsive consumer assistance.

Dos and Do n'ts of Case Battles

To make decision-making easier throughout a session, keep this quick-reference list helpful:

- **DO** set a win limitation. If up by a significant margin, leave with the profit.
- **DO** begin with smaller sized lobbies to comprehend how the platform works.

- **DON'T** view case battles as a reputable way to make money or make a living.
